**THE SLCA BOARD
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Progress with the McGeachie trails



A tentative network of trails has been defined extending to a total of perhaps 8 kilometers, with the opportunity to expand that in the future. There are short loops, and longer

loops, to cater to hikers of various ages and fitness. The parking area has received nine loads of fill, which has been leveled to make room for at least eight or ten vehicles. Some work still need to be done to remove a few large stones that were deposited in the fill.

Plans are underway to build gating and signage for the start of the trail. We hope to make a short section at the start of the trail accessible by persons with disabilities. I am also awaiting approval of funding for a "bear proof" garbage bin, and a wheel chair accessible privy.

A naturalist from Bancroft has hiked much of the property with me and begun the process of identifying plants and wildlife that would be of interest to hikers. I anticipate that he will assist in creating informative brochures that will explain to hikers what they are observing at various locations.

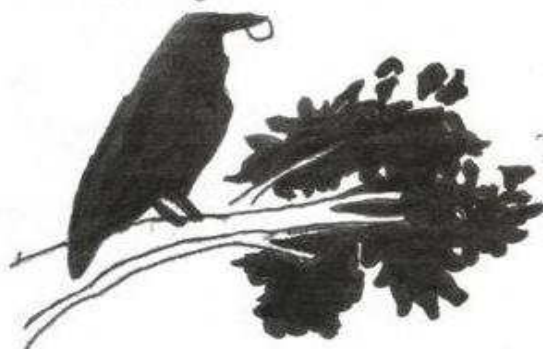
On Tuesday, November 17, four people from Crowe Valley Conservation spent about four hours hiking over the proposed trails and photographing many items of interest. Crowe Valley is interested in eventually establishing a few Yurts that could be an attraction for groups who may want to camp overnight on the property. We have located an open area, not far from Steenburg Creek, where such a facility could be situated.

I continue to be impressed with the natural beauty and diversity within this conservation area. It is a resource, which we hope to get included with the Hastings County initiative to catalogue and publicize tourist attractions throughout the County.

For those of you who love the outdoors, I encourage you to take a few hours to get away from it all in your own back yard. If you discover birds, plants or animals of interest we would love to hear about your experiences.

From the Lake Steward



High Water Levels in 2009

Don't panic, we are not sinking. The high water levels this year were the result of significant precipitation and drainage restrictions on Bass Creek. The stop logs were not put in at all this year, but we still experienced significantly higher than normal water levels. The Beavers seem to be the cause of the outflow restrictions. When the water depth becomes a problem for those with lower level properties, you should contact the Crowe Valley Conservation Authority to notify them of your concerns.

New Boating Licence Effective September 2009

The federal boating regulations require you to carry a boating license with you when operating a motorized boat. The authorities patrol our water's often, so please familiarize yourself with the law to avoid the \$250 minimum fine.

Your operator card can be obtained on-line through various sources, in addition to a facility in Bancroft operated by 247Cottage Rentals.

Invasive Species Report

We now share our lake with two invasive species.

Eurasian Millfoil: A researcher visiting friends at Steenburg Lake has identified Eurasian Millfoil in the lake. Eurasian millfoil is an aggressive invasive weed.

Zebra Mussels: Recently, David Golem reported that adult zebra mussels have been identified during water line maintenance near the public beach.

Please let us know if you've identified additional infestation, or a growing population.

The zebra mussel is a species of small freshwater mussel.

They are relatively small, with adults ranging from 1/4 to 1 1/2 inches long. They have tiny stripes down their shells. Zebra Mussels have a D-shaped shell. They attach to things with 'strings', byssal threads, which come out of their umbo on the dorsal (hinged) side. Removal of the mussel is therefore difficult.

Zebra mussels live up to four to five years. A female zebra mussel begins to reproduce at two years of age. In terms of reproduction, zebra mussels are among the most prolific of all animals. An adult female Zebra mussel may produce between 30,000 and one million eggs per year. Spawning usually begins in the months from late spring to early summer by free-swimming larvae. About two percent of zebra mussels reach adulthood.

We've reported on these concerns in the past, and we must once again stress the importance of properly cleaning your boats prior to entering our lake. You should make sure your guests take the same precautions if they are launching into our lake. **If you choose to ignore these precautions, than you are putting our lake, and our investments at risk.**

Rock Markers

For a number of years, the SLCA has provided a Rock Marker map (which is posted on the website), and have placed certain Rock Markers around Steenburg Lake as a courtesy to the residents. This has proven to be a difficult undertaking, especially during the recent fluctuation in water levels.

Please remember that these markers are approximate, and this service is provided on a 'best effort' basis. The SLCA cannot be responsible for any damage that may be caused by rocks.

During this fall's Cottage Life show, we met with Terry Rees, Executive Director of FOCA, to understand how other lakes are

addressing this function. It turns out that this is a problem for many lakes around the province.

FOCA has been working with Transport Canada and local distribution partners to create an approved marker system for our lakes. Terry showed us a prototype of a new marker, which is a one-piece sealed unit with reflective tape & FOCA markings. The final product is scheduled to be available next year.

During our spring meeting, the SLCA will discuss if and how this system might be phased onto our lake.

ATV Safety

All Terrain Vehicles, or ATVs, are popular machines used for work and play. People enjoy the thrill of riding up and down hills and jumping over ditches. Operated properly, an ATV can be a lot of fun and very useful. Operated carelessly, an ATV can make the rider "All Too Vulnerable" to injury, or even death.

In 2002, ATV crashes resulted in 357 fatalities and 113,900 injured riders. The number of fatalities was up by 67 percent from 1997. The number of injured riders more than doubled in the same time period.

What's especially troubling about those statistics is that most ATV-related injuries are preventable. The most common causes are unsafe speed, drinking and driving, driving on paved roads and into regular traffic, driving in unsafe weather conditions, and driving without proper supervision or training.

The responsibility for careful operation rests almost entirely with the ATV rider.

Manufacturers, outdoors organizations, and safety agencies do their best to inform

ATV users of safe operating procedures, such as:

- Read the owner's manual carefully and follow the operating procedures described. Pay special attention to the warnings in the manual and all labels on the machine.
- Do not operate an ATV without proper instruction. Take a training course. An ATV is not a toy.
- Do not let children ride an adult-size ATV. Children (and some adults) lack the strength and skill to correct an unstable ATV weighing 500 to 1,000 pounds and capable of traveling 55 mph or more.
- Children under 12 should not operate an ATV. Children age 12-16 should ride ATVs with an engine size of 90cc or less.
- Always wear an approved motorcycle helmet. Also wear eye-protection, boots with ankle support, gloves, long pants, and a long sleeved shirt or jacket as conditions warrant.
- Never carry a passenger, which can upset the balance of the ATV and cause you to lose control.
- Never operate an ATV on pavement. They are not designed for use on paved surfaces and may be difficult to control.
- Do not operate an ATV on any public road, even dirt or gravel roads. Collision with cars, trucks, and other motor vehicles can be deadly.
- Do not ride at excessive speeds. With their short wheelbase and maneuverability, ATVs are very unstable and easily flip on uneven ground. Go at a speed that is proper for the terrain, visibility conditions, and your experience.

- Be especially cautious when approaching hills, turns, and obstacles and when operating on unfamiliar or rough terrain. Keep at least 10 feet between your ATV and another vehicles.
- Do not consume alcohol or drugs before or while operating an ATV.

ATV Noise at Night

Most ATV's employ "thumper" style 4 stroke engines that emit a distinct low pitch drone. This sound can be heard for great distances around the lake at night. Your neighbours will appreciate your considerate use of your ATV with respect to noise emmissions, especially later in the summer evenings.

Recognition for Stealth Cottaging

This recognition goes to the cottager on Steenburg Lake that exemplifies the aims and goals of stealth cottaging: not to be seen! This year's Blue Ribbon, goes to cottage number 50 for repainting their white cottage dark green with a taupe trim. Ya can't even see it anymore! BooYaH! Runner up is cottage 197 on Birch Isle for converting their white trim to cammo green.

Nesting & Breeding

Territory

Common Loons return to their breeding lakes as soon as the ice melts in the early spring. The size of their territory is typically 60 to 200 acres, although it can be larger or smaller.

Loons are easily disturbed during the nesting season and prefer to nest on lakes where there is little human activity. If there is too much disturbance, loons may abandon their nest.

On its breeding ground, the Common Loon is highly territorial. Its defensive behavior increases during the nesting period and peaks in the first weeks after the chicks hatch.

These birds are thought to mate for life and often use the same nest site year after year.

Nest

The Common Loon nests as close to the water as possible. Islands, which provide protection from predators, are the preferred nest location.

Both sexes build the bulky nest, which consists of twigs, grasses, reeds, and other aquatic vegetation. Some sources indicate that the eggs are laid directly in a depression in the mud and the nest materials are collected after incubation begins.

Incubation and Fledging


The Common Loon typically lays two eggs, occasionally one or three. The eggs are olive-brown to olive-green with scattered dark spots or blotches.

Both parents incubate the eggs, which hatch in about 28 to 30 days. The chicks leave the nest within 24 hours of hatching. At this point, they can swim but usually spend some time riding on their parents' backs during the first couple of weeks. This may help the chicks keep warm and avoid predators.

For the first 8 weeks or so, the young loons are fed by their parents. Over the following weeks, they gradually learn to dive well enough to obtain their own food. By three months of age or sooner, they are able to fly and become independent of their parents.
