President's Message

Dear Members of the Lake Association:

It is May 5. Today the first hummingbird of this year buzzed near my window for a moment, and was gone. It was probably in route to a summer home still further north, and stopped to have a drink at my feeder after a long and tiring journey. I'm sure his mates will not be far behind, and we will again have regular visits from these precious little life forms.

The ice went off the lake on April 15, although it had been threatening to break up for at least a week before that, with black patches everywhere, and open lanes along the shore. Again this year the water was about as high as it ever gets, since we also had a couple of days of fairly heavy rain just before the snow and ice melt peaked.

Unfortunately, late in the winter we had a break in at a couple of cottages off the South Road. One instance would appear to have been a kid, perhaps fighting with his parents, who stole what he needed to set up a makeshift tent in the bush nearby, and to keep warm during the last snowfall. Several people on the lake helped by keeping a close watch on the cottage, and checking to be sure that others had not suffered the same fate. The police were notified but I believe they were not successful in identifying the guilty person.

Once again, the issue of assessed property values at the lake is in the news. After a freeze for the last three years Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) is making up for lost time. The average annual increase in values in this area is about eleven percent applied in each of the next four years. It continues to be cottage properties which see the large increases, while properties off the water, and in area towns and cities, have relatively small increases. Despite the fact that most Townships have tried to offset the increases in assessment by lowering their tax rates, they are working with averages, so those properties with above average increases in assessment will also see a real tax increase when they receive their second notice this summer. FOCA has given this matter a lot of attention,

but it appears their lobbying has not changed this reality in cottage country across Ontario.

A number of people are interested in creating a network of hiking trails through the McGeachie Conservation Area. Crowe Valley has agreed to allow this to happen, and the MNR seems willing to lend some help. There is a naturalists group in Bancroft whose members have expressed an interest as well. It is my hope that we can identify and catalogue a wide variety of plant, animal and bird varieties, and help to educate hikers, as well as to help people keep fit and in touch with nature. Contact me if you are interested.

This will be my last "message from the president" after six years. The members of the Executive are innovative, energetic and motivated residents of the lake, and I am confident this Association will grow in strength as the years pass. To accomplish that, they need your continued support, and participation, so when you are asked to help out please donate a few of the precious hours at the cottage so that life here will continue to be excellent. I have enjoyed being part of the process. See you at the AGM on Aug 2.

MNR Splake Stocking Program

Good News for anglers! MNR Bancroft Mazinaw District stocked 7500 Splake in 2006 and 7000 Splake in 2008 in our lake.

Save the Bass!

Don't fish near the shore of Steenburg Lake in the spring. The bass are on their spawning beds until late June. Once an adult male (baby bass protector) has been taken off it's nest by a catch and release angler, it rarely returns to protect the fry. This leaves the nest open to predator Rock Bass, Perch, and Sunfish. Congratulations out of season angler – you just killed a lot of future whoppers! Instead, use May and June to go after the Splake in the deep sections of the lake away from the bass spawning beds until the season opens in late June.

Stealth Cottaging

A good time at the lake includes a healthy mix of wild times with friends and neighbours, snoozing in the hammock, work weekends, camp fires, and communing with nature. This is your slice of heaven. You cherish the view from your porch (often the screen saver on your computer). Think about what you neighbours see when they look across the lake at your place. Do they see a dock poking out of a densely treed shore and wonder what your place looks like, or do they see a white boathouse, a beautifully manicured treeless lawn, sand beach, patio lanterns, and a huge yellow blow up trampoline out front. If the shore across from you looked like your place, would you be happy? Consider the following to turn Steenburg Lake back to nature:

1. *Shade your outdoor lights* so they point down, not out in the lake – avoid the "Honest Eds" look.
2. Let the shoreline go back to nature. Create a natural buffer at the lake edge back 45 feet (15 meters) from the shore.
3. Camouflage your cottage – go with colours that blend in such as dark green, dark blue or dark brown. White and yellow stick out like a sore thumb.

Your cottage will be your screen saver that you look forward to all winter long. Wouldn't it be great to have the best of all worlds – a summer retreat in a natural environment. Always keep in mind that your lake environment is fragile.

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It's a great time to consider an upgrade to your cottage Septic System

Take advantage of this year's Federal Government **Home Renovation Tax Credit** (up to \$1350) to bring your septic up to the current building code requirements before the rush starts in a few years (as a result of the proposed Ontario Government's clean water legislation and mandatory septic system inspections.)

Septic Pumping: If you and your neighbors can coordinate 3 or 4 septic systems to be pumped, then Don Tripp (613-474-2237) is willing to reduce his price from \$150 to \$125. You have to be on the same road, and have Don make a single trip to complete three 800 gallon septic pump outs, or four 600 gallon septic system pump outs. Post your request to on the Steenburg Lake website and watch for other cottagers to join in the discussion.

Septic Inspection: Several Steenburg Lake Cottagers have recommended Kirk Tripp, a local septic system installer. He charges \$200 to \$250 to inspect your current system. Again, work with fellow cottagers to arrange yourselves into groups so Kirk minimizes travel time and related expenses.

For those of you who are familiar with Google Maps, you know that you can add your own pictures and videos here also. To see them, select 'more...' from the map.

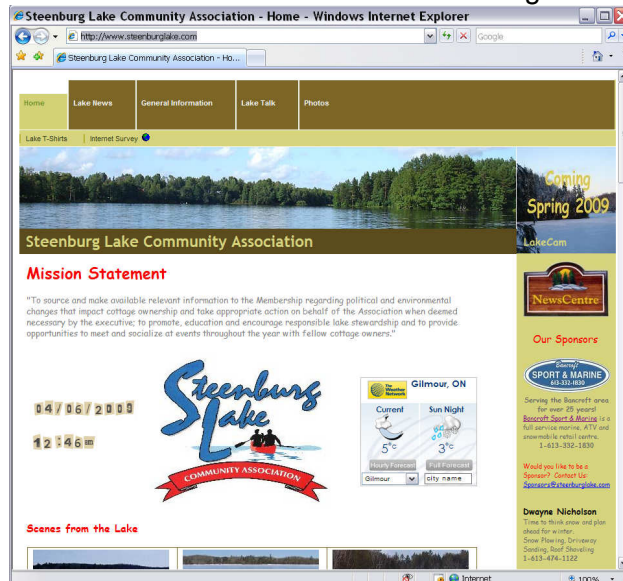
And don't forget to let us know if there are some interesting sites that we should be highlighting.

LABOUR DAY WEEK-END 1961

We started out from our home in Barrie for Steenburg Lake early Friday morning for a week at the cottage. We stopped at my home in Toronto for lunch with my Grandma and Granddad. During our visit Grandma said that on the news there had been a bank robbery in Havelock and the robbers were spotted heading toward Coe Hill.

I thought nothing of this at the time.

When we arrived at Steenburg Lake South Road we were met by an OPP officer who stopped us. He asked us where we were going, and of course we said to the cottage. He advised us at this time, even though we are in the cottage, to keep our car locked at all times.

Well being young (18 years of age) this scared me a little. I did not sleep well that night.

Saturday morning we were to meet my mom and dad at Madoc at the grocery store and direct them to the cottage.

Everything was fine, more friends from Toronto arrived and we were settled in. Now there are 8 of us. Everyone enjoying the lake.

Over our dining table was hung a map of the lake, which showed where the cottage was located and how large the lake is.

During the evening we gathered around the table to play cards and have a few drinks. I was still a little concerned, since there had been police in the neighbourhood since our arrival. My dad said don't worry these robbers are miles from here.

It was getting onto 2 am, when a search light was shone into our cottage. The OPP were patrolling around the lake.

Who could concentrate on a card game now, so off to bed we went. Very little sleep was had by me.

In the morning we headed to the lake for a swim before breakfast. Being a city girl and not used to cottage life this was great. We had no sooner got into the lake when 2 covers over came a row boat with an OPP officer rowing it back

across the lake. This boat had been used by the robbers and left there.

All day police patrolled our road.

Finally late in the day we heard that the robbers had been captured near the railroad tracks on the east side of highway 62.

At this point being a city girl I had been in the woods long enough and on Monday morning headed back to Toronto when everyone else was leaving.. I certainly wasn't going to stay another day, especially when the lake would be deserted.

Now we spend a lot of time at the lake, and wouldn't want to be anywhere else especially in the spring and fall so peaceful.

I have been asking all of you for your stories and it dawned on me that I haven't told you my story. So here it goes.....

My story starts in the early 70's. We were living in Oshawa and our son Dan wanted to play hockey. He joined the church hockey league and ended up on a team coached by Jack Horne and Bob Boyce. We became friends with the Horne's and the Boyce's immediately. We had lots in common and mainly boys who played hockey. We were invited to the Boyce's cottage in 1972 who just happened to have the Horne's as neighbours. They invited us to their cottage on Steenburg Lake. Well where on earth is Steenburg Lake I asked????????? They gave us the directions and once we finally reached the South shore road it seemed we drove forever on the dirt road in the woods. When we arrived it was love at first sight. My boys were so excited to visit their hockey friends. We had a great weekend. The Horne family were being transferred to Australia for a couple of years and lucky for us they thought

because we were friends with the Boyce's that maybe we would like to take care of their cottage while they were down under. Of course we were delighted. Wow I thought how lucky we are, yes the luckiest family in the world. We took care of the Horne's cottage for the summer of 73 and until the end of July of 74. During this time we put a new top on their deck as we kind of fell through a rotten board. Ron had a meeting with some racoons over the garbage one night. I remember Ron yelling at them. " I don't care if you are wearing masks I still know who you are and this is MY garbage." During that time we got to know a lot of members on that part of the south shore. The cottage next to the Horne's burnt down and left Tom and May Hill without a roof over their heads. While rebuilding their cottage they stayed in the Horne's Bunkie. I had never seen two people work so hard that summer. We got to know them quite well and became friends. When the Horne's arrived home from Australia we were able to convince the Horne's and the Boyce's to rent their cottages for a couple of summers. Once our boys started working their summers we didn't cottage for our holidays.

Then in 1990 Ron and I had 2 weeks vacation and wondered what to do. The boys were either working or on their own so it was just the two of us. After discussing what to do, we asked ourselves which holidays did we enjoy the most in the past. Well we enjoyed a cottage holiday the most. So that summer we went on a hunt for a cottage. We went east and north and ended back at Steenburg Lake. We had found a couple of cottages on other lakes but still when we ended up on Steenburg Lake it felt like home. We fell in love with the McCarthy's cottage on the north shore road. We didn't know anyone here and all we knew was that it was approximately across from where Miller's Marina was. We went home and worked on our finances. After a bit of work we managed to make an offer and yes the rest is history. Our boys could not believe their parents had bought a cottage on Steenburg Lake. As young boys they had many fond memories of Steenburg Lake. They both learned how to swim in Steenburg Lake. This is where we discovered our dog Shultz couldn't swim. Yes there are dogs who can not swim and ours was one of them.

Well in the year 2000 Ron and I retired and thought it would be nice to live at the cottage at the lake. We never imagined this was even possible. April 2000 we moved to the cottage. We had to wait until the ice went out as we were not winterized. From April to June I washed dishes in the bathtub, cooked our meals with an electric frying pan while Ron gutted the kitchen and rebuilt. Our refrigerator was in the living room. This was Ron's first renovation and with the help of Don Fitzgibbon everything turned out just great. It was an adventure and we loved every minute of it well at least I did. No Ron did too but sometimes he just won't admit it. Where else could you wake up every morning and with coffee or tea in hand look at this beautiful Steenburg Lake. NO WHERE !!!!!!!!!!!!!!!

During the last 9 years we have met many members and have wonderful neighbours. Barb Rockwell talked me into taking over the memberships of the association. I was reluctant but I will admit I have enjoyed meeting so many nice members and working with the canvassers. The executive has changed over the years and again working with so many nice people who love the lake has been a pleasure. We have made our cottage a home and have been very comfortable and we LOVE living here on STEENBURG LAKE. The last 9 years have been delightful. What do we enjoy the most? Well I have to say I have enjoyed the seasons. The FALL is the

Rochester School System Comes to Bass Lake

A History of Four Cottages

As far as I can tell Mr. Carpenter, a science teacher in the Rochester School System came to Bass Lake around 1919. He was so impressed by the beauty of the lake that he went back to Rochester and got several more teachers interested in coming to the lake. Each assisted the other in constructing their cottage. Mr. Carpenters cottage is #50

The other teachers that came up were Mr. Rottman (#131), Mr. Johncox (#29). These two were industrial art teachers and accounted for much of the planning. The forth was Mr. Kellogg (#30) a school principal. Mr. Johncox's and Mr. Kellogg's cottage are still owned by the family of the original builder.

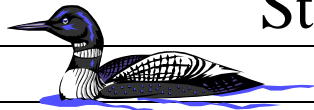
Carpenter, Johncox and Rottaman had a long and happy time at the lake. Not so for Mr. Kellogg. He passed away the year that the cottage was completed. The Hughes family purchased the cottage from Marion Christie (daughter of Mr. Kellogg) in 1977. Judie Hughes has been in residence every year since 1929.

Mr Rottman and Mr. Johncox decided that they would each build a sailing dinghy. These sailboats were things of beauty and every piece of rigging and hardware was constructed by them. For years they raced each other on the channel. Of the two only Mr Johncox's survives in their boat house. The maintenance and repair of the dingy was undertaken by Mr. Burton and Bob Johncox. The elder Johncox was ready take the dingy out to the middle of the lake and sink it as it had fallen into such dis-repair. Mr. Burton pleaded with him to allow him to undertake the needed repairs. Those were accomplished and the dingy survived. Bob Johncox put in a new transom and Betty Burton made a new set of sails and about 10 years ago it made its first sail in over 30 years. It has not been in the lake since.
