
A Message from Steve Churchill, President SLCA (2009-2011)

Zebra Mussel Report

Mussel Larvae (Veligers) Found in Steenburg Lake. AS reported in the fall newsletter, a two litre water sample taken from various areas of steenburg lake was tested and found to contain two zebra mussel larvae. This confirms the long rumoured presence of zebra mussels in the lake. So far, no cottager has noticed the presence of adult zebra mussels. 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Water Quality Report

Reports of blue-green algae in Ontario lakes are on the rise according to the Ministry of Environment. Cyanobacterial blooms result from oxygen deprivation in the lake. A lack of oxygen allows naturally occurring phosphous to be chemically unlocked from the lake bottom. Phophorus is fertilizer and the algae is a plant - hence a great increase in food (phosphorus results in a bloom of algae. Oxygen deprivation takes place when the warm oxygen rich surface water fails to adequately mix with the cold oxygen depleted deeper water in the lake every fall. Global warming might be hindering the mixing process by allowing the lake to stay ice free longer each vear.

We cottagers exacerbate the problem by providing non-

natural sources of phosphates from our uses including: use of shampoo, dish washing soaps, clothes washing soaps, and lawn fertilizers that have been traditional sources of phosphates. Your Ontario government has been doing a good job at getting rid of phosphates. Have you noticed lawn fertilizers all have "0" for the middle number (no more phosphate!) and most cleaning products no longer contain phosphates. To keep Steenburg Lake's water as clean is possible, we cottagers need good stewardship practices that include eliminating the use of fertilized lawns, letting the 15 meter shore zone "go back to nature", pump out our septic systems on a regular basis, and replace the old washing soaps with new phosphate free products.



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Goat Report -Baaaaa!



Since the first sighting of a goat on the south road a few years back, we've seen more evidence of the horned mammals appearing in strange places. I always wondered about the presence of goats on the shores or in the waters of Steenburg Lake. Harking way back to 1972 or so, Rick Burke and his brother Bud had a red three point hydro with an old QD-10 on it - a very cool rig! The prop was only partially submerged and therefore made a lot of noise - which was really cool too. It went along pretty good. One day Rick submarined the boat into a monster wave (perhaps the result of Moby Dick) and was thrown out over the bow. Here is what I wonder about - was Rick distracted by a goat-sighting and hence unaware of the man made tidal wave approaching? Perhaps we should ask...



Fishing Report:

Fishermen – Stay away from the Shore before Bas Season Opens - Let the Bass Spawn!

The best way to develop and improve your fishery is to preserve the fish we already have including the just hatched fry. The male Bass is the nest defender. It protects the unhatched eggs and later the fry from natural predators like Rock Bass, Minnows and Sun Fish. It will strike out at anything that gets near its nest including fishing lures from fishermen that are fishing out of season. Once caught, the male Bass rarely returns to the nest leaving the eggs/fry to the

predators. This past spring, I was lying face down on the end of the dock on a bright sunny day watching all the life in the lake when I noticed a big black cloud moving near the surface. This was a real concern – I was thinking algae bloom or some new invasive scum. On close inspection this cloud was composed of thousands of very thin 2 mm long wiggling pin-shaped objects. I scooped up a handful of water with some of these wiggling things and discovered microscopic bass! Wow, a massive school of bass! I ask you fellow fishermen to stay away from the shores and weed beds of Steenburg lake until bass season opens in late June. Work on catching Splake out in the deep parts of the lake.



Naturalize the Shore Line:

Although a fertilized, weed free lawn to the shore line with a nice man made sandy beach at the shore might be appealing to many cottages because it offers a great view of the lake and a place for the toddlers to play, it is devastating to the Steenburg Lake ecosystem. The water quality of our lake depends on us residents preventing debris, silt and sand from washing into the lake. The best shore line is a 15 meter (45 foot) buffer of natural vegetation that has been carefully "bonzaied" to permit a view of the lake. So fellow fishermen, take a look at your shoreline and think about the fish. The more natural the entire lake's shoreline is, the better the fishing will be!

<u>Lake</u> <u>Stewardship</u>

Green Boating – A stewardship approach to boating.

1. Getting the most out of your fuel. Start by removing water from the bilge, then load the boat so that it has weight well distributed – too much weight in the back will cause the boat to plane slowly. Trim down the engine, throttle up to get on plane, then throttle back to cruise and trim the boat "up" to get the bow out of the water. Too much trim up will cause the boat to porpoise (bounce).



The optimal use of fuel is when the boat is just holding its own on plane. Wide open throttle burns about double the amount of gas per hour compared to "nicely trimmed and up on plane".

3.Start each season with fresh gear oil in the lower unit, fresh engine oil in four stroke crank cases then inspect and remove rough burrs and nicks off the skeg and propeller or replace damaged props as they can destroy a lower units bearings in a short period of time. Polish and wax the bottom of the hull and lower unit every spring. If you find your boat has trouble

planing or you spend a lot of time pulling skiers, wakeboarders, and tubers up on plane, consider changing the pitch of the prop to a lower pitch.

4. For a small boat that is underpowered and struggles to get up on plane, and doesn't go very fast while on plane, first check the weight distribution. Move the gas tank and anchor forward. I moved my battery forward on a 14' aluminum boat with a 15hp motor, and the "hole shot" dramatically improved. If weight distribution won't work, then consider changing the pitch of the propeller and/or adding a bolt on hydrofoil. The key to fuel conservation is to get on plane then be able to throttle back. The lower pitch propeller acts like dropping a gear on a mountain bike - lower pitch is like first gear - easy to accelerate.

5.Make sure your engine is properly tuned. It may need to have the carburetor cleaned or have new spark plugs installed.

6.Either run slow with minimal wake, or throttle up on plane. Don't run in between these speed as it both uses more fuel and creates a potentially damaging wake that can

impact the shore line.

7.Cruise along the shoreline at "no wake" speed, and in the middle of the lake when on plane.

8.To reduce noise, inspect the motor cowling for missing grommets, and poorly fitting seals. Fix the seals and reinstall the cowling.

9.If you are considering replacing your engine, new four stroke or direct fuel injected 2 stroke technology is impressively quiet and has negligible visible emissions. The new four strokes are about 30% more efficient than older 2

stroke engines. Do make sure that everyone that will be using the boat is able to pull start the engine, or opt for electric start. A slightly larger motor that gets on plane quickly and then can be throttled back will be more efficient than a smaller motor that has to run at or near wide open throttle to maintain the boat on plane.

10.When choosing a small fishing/utility boat, a longer wider boat will be more efficient than a short narrow boat. I highly recommend the green duck boat/jon boat/barge such as a 1448 or a 1648. I have been able to pull a 130 lb wakeboarder up behind a 16' 1668 jon boat with a 9.9 hp motor and two adults on board. The same boat will plane 4 adults with baggage. A 12' boat with the same motor would not be able to do that.

11. Having driven around the lake in various sea fleas, ski boats, and good old "Hidditt" for hundreds of hours since 1969, I can tell you that just a touch below full throttle makes a big difference on fuel economy and noise. Back off on the throttle a bit, no one will notice the drop in speed, enjoy the fuel savings and reduced noise.

12.Remember to wash your boat well away from the lake. Mid season scrubs work well with a little extra elbow grease and a sponge.

13. When in shallow water, make an effort to not disturb the bottom of the lake.

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
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How's Your Johnson?

Remove all sources of food from the cottage as well, which should further discourage these squatters from making your cottage their home. Chimneys provide another entranceway for many types of critters - including raccoons. Be sure to cover your chimneys tightly to both prevent them from entering and to prevent birds from falling down the chimney while you're away. Have you ever seen what a raccoon can do to your kitchen after it breaks open a few packs of left over Jello?

Burglar-Proofing



On Thurs., Feb. 17, the Bancroft OPP were on the North Road when they spotted an ATV matching the

an ATV matching the description of a stolen vehicle. Two 17 year old males were arrested for stolen property, and the investigation revealed that they were involved with several break-in and thefts on Steenburg lake.

Police say that more thefts occur from cottages during the winter than at any other time of the year. Though burglary can be covered by your cottage insurance policy, theft cannot. In other words, there must be a forcible sign of entry and/or exit in order for your claim to be considered. To help prevent break-ins, you should completely cover the windows. This prevents passers-by from seeing inside and dissuades temptation. Of course, it is still good practise to take all of your valuables with you, just in case anything unfortunate does occur. For other items that cannot be transported home

with you, take special care to securely lock up anything that can be stolen. Take an inventory of these items and write down the serial numbers where applicable. It is also a good idea to take photographs of both your cottage and the items within, as this may be of great benefit to you during the claims process. If you don't have a friend who can routinely check on your investment, there are companies that specialize in cottage care. These companies can help shovel your driveway and, if you choose to leave your heat on during the winter, can check on your place to ensure that everything is in order. Remember, locks only keep the honest people out!

Internet **Update**

Having reported so much progress in our quest for Internet on our lake, I truly expected to be able to report some good news as part of this newsletter. But not yet.

For now, we must patiently wait for Bell Canada to put their new Internet tower into service.

As of December 2010, a new cellular tower owned by Rogers and located on hwy62 at Millbridge Road was put into service. That tower is now providing Voice and Internet service between Eldorado heading north up hwy 62 until around Jordan Lake.

Bell Canada also has a new tower on Hwy 62 that is located just south of Jordan Lake South Road. This tower is fully built and powered, but is missing antennae, so it is not yet in service. I'm hopeful that this tower will provide our lake with Voice and Internet in time for Summer 2011. And since Bell & Rogers typically share towers, either carrier should be able to provide you with equipment and a service plan to meet your needs.

Of course, neither the Bell nor the Rogers business offices will confirm any dates or availability of their service for our area, so please keep checking the website www.steenburglake.com for updates.







The Trail Next Door

Steenburg Lake draws you here to enjoy nature and the tranquility of the great outdoors. But there is more than the lake available here for our enjoyment. We are right beside a wonderland of forest and hills and ponds and swamps that are begging you to visit. Whether you are interested in a brisk walk in the woods, or you have a special interest in forest plants, or if you are into birds and animals, you can see all this and more within the McGeachie Conservation Area, accessed by two entrances off the North road.

The McGeachie property was donated to Crowe Valley Conservation Authority by the McGeachie family. It comprises just about 500 acres of forest and swamp land, and includes two creeks, with beaver dams and other ponds. Records suggest that the property has not been logged since the original logging of pine in the 1870s, and recent checks have indicated many trees that are at least 100 years old. Because of differences in elevation on the property there are uplands with stands of oak, maple and basswood, intermixed with some birch, beech and ash. In the lower lands there are old stands of cedar and hemlock with the usual mix of tamarack and balsam. Along the creeks there are many varieties of shrubs and herbs, with wild flowers almost everywhere.

Birds and animals are in evidence throughout the property. Among the many animals are deer and moose, coyote, otter, with the occasional visit by North Hastings elk.

The trail system is laid out in loops which allow hikers and skiers to choose the length and

difficulty that suits their individual preferences. At present there are approximately 8 kilometres of marked trails. Please note that all motorized vehicles are prohibited, but cyclists are welcome. There are two parking areas both of which are accessible off North Steenburg Lake Road about one kilometre west of Trudy's store and gas on Highway 62. The first parking area allows access to the century old cabin which is rented to the public by Crowe Valley Conservation, and is the start of the original trail system established by Jack McGeachie many years ago. This is a short and fairly level loop that is a good starter for a family outing. The second parking area is marked with a sign "McGeachie Conservation Area Hiking Trails" at the road. This is the entrance to the much larger and more challenging portion of the trail system. We suggest good quality footwear for hikers, especially during the winter and spring, when you will probably encounter some deep snow and wet or muddy spots in the trail. During the winter, snow shoes are an excellent way to get around.


The blue trail winds its way from the west entrance along the side of a rocky ridge, then down through a dark and

swampy lowland, then up to the top of a plateau about 100 feet above the valley. From there it

progresses northerly to end at a huge beaver pond created by a dam that must be seven feet high. This trail is a bit less than three kilometres, one way, and there are several small stream crossings, as well as a few hills, so it could be a challenge for your first effort.

The orange trail is another route to the north of the property, hooking into the blue trail twice, so you can take an alternate route back if you wish. The southern portion of the orange route parallels a high rocky ridge where you might discover a bear's winter den tucked in a small cave, or dug in under a fallen tree root.

The green trail is a beautiful side trail looping off the blue trail and back. It parallels the creek that flows from the big beaver dam down to Steenburg Lake. There are places where you can step out onto one of the original "beaver meadows" where settlers harvested hay to feed their animals. You will see some very large and old hemlock trees along this trail, and they overhang to make the trail almost spooky in places. Near the north end of the green trail is a short purple trail which leads directly to a notch in the rocks where the beavers used to have a dam. The remains are still there, along with the stumps left by the beavers. That dam burst in the

From the parking lot, the distance up the green trail and then returning on the blue trail is about one kilometre, so it is a fairly easy track for anyone who enjoys walking.

There is a short and pretty black trail which links the blue trail and the orange trail about half way up its length, meandering through the maple forest near to a big swamp. There is a very good chance you can see the tracks of moose in the mud where the black and orange trails meet. This also is an easy way to cut your walk short if you are pressed for time, or if you are gradually working toward better physical conditioning.


Future plans include expanding the trails into a couple of areas not accessible at the present, and in the longer term we hope to raise funds to build a bridge across Steenburg Creek to link the two areas within the property. Crowe Valley Conservation has also been working on creating a couple of state-of-theart Yurts which could be used for educational purposes, and perhaps rented out to those who want a basic outdoor camp experience.

Since this is a Conservation area we ask that people who use the trails respect the natural environment by refraining from cutting trees, picking flowers or depositing garbage, and hunting is forbidden except if authorized during the fall deer hunt.


